## **FORGOTTEN HARVEST HIRED DIRECTOR OF OUTREACH FOR SCHOOLS AND FAITH-BASED ORGANIZATIONS**

OAK PARK, Mich., (September 6, 2011) – Bailie Rosenthal, Ph.D., has joined Forgotten Harvest as Director of Outreach for Schools and Faith-Based Organizations.

In her role as outreach director, Rosenthal will focus on extending and energizing reciprocal partnerships with schools, service and religious organizations to propel their respective missions. With Forgotten Harvest, she will utilize her networks to improve outcomes and expand resources for all collaborators in the partnership chain.

Previously, Rosenthal served as principal of Bussey Center for Early Childhood Education for more than 30 years. She was Administrator of the Year in 2003 and received the Nancy Widman award for community service in 2010. Rosenthal also was selected by the federal government to participate in the Head Start Quality Research consortium, as well as the White House Work Group on Early Childhood Education.

Rosenthal earned a bachelor's degree with distinction at the University of Michigan, as well as master's and doctorate degrees at Wayne State University in speech pathology, social work, hearing impairment and psychology.

She also attended the University of Chicago, Roosevelt University, San Diego State College and University of Georgia and was an adjunct instructor at Wayne State University and Oakland University.
