“Hats Against Hunger” Fashion Show and Charity Auction Featuring Mr. Song Millinery to Support Forgotten Harvest

OAK PARK, MICH.—February 10, 2012—One of Metro Detroit’s best-known names in fashion will put his hats where his heart is on February 23, 2012 when Mr. Song Millinery and Forgotten Harvest fight hunger with the high fashion event, “Hats Against Hunger” inside Detroit’s newly-restored Madison Theater.

The centerpiece of the evening will be a strolling fashion show featuring volunteer and celebrity “Hat Ambassadors” from the business and nonprofit community, followed by a charity auction in which 12 of the models’ hats will be auctioned to benefit Forgotten Harvest’s food rescue operations.

The evening also will be the first official promotional event for Michigan F.A.S.H. Fest, a premiere annual festival celebrating the cultural impact of Fashion, Art, Sound and History. Forgotten Harvest will be the sole charity beneficiary of the event, which will take place in Birmingham in mid-September.

Hats Against Hunger is also in partnership with Woodard Development Services, which provides consulting services that focus on the prevention of homelessness and assist many individuals who receive food assistance from Forgotten Harvest and its partners.

The event begins at 6 p.m., with the auction scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Tickets to the event are \$25, which includes, appetizers and drinks and can be purchased at www.forgottenharvest.org.

About Forgotten Harvest

Forgotten Harvest was formed in 1990 to fight two problems: hunger and waste. Forgotten Harvest “rescued” more than 23 million pounds of food last year by collecting surplus prepared and perishable food from 455 sources, including grocery stores, fruit and vegetable markets, restaurants, caterers, dairies, farmers, wholesale food distributors and other Health Department-approved sources. This donated food, which would otherwise go to waste, is delivered free-of-charge to more than 200 emergency food providers in the Metro Detroit area.
