WHO: **Dave Coulier** is perhaps best known for his work on the long-running hit ABC television series *Full House* and the prime-time hit *America's Funniest People*. In addition to multiple other television appearances, Coulier is highly regarded for his voice-over talents working on several popular cartoons. Coulier also appeared on VH1's #1 rated series *The Surreal Life*. His family-friendly stand-up act has sold out shows across the country.
