

We are fortunate at Forgotten Harvest to have so many people who give their time or their treasure to make our mission possible. On January 16th, we hosted a Harvest Circle Engagement Day so members of our Harvest Circle — donors

who give \$1,000 or more a year — could volunteer in our warehouse and get a behind-the-scenes look at what we do here at Forgotten Harvest! These donors joined our other volunteers to take food that was donated to us in bulk quantity and create family-sized containers to distribute to families, seniors, and Veterans

who come to our mobile pantries. Thanks to our hardworking volunteers, the poundage repacked that day at our morning and afternoon sessions broke records!

When tasked with a service project as part of his leadership training, 7th grader Anay Pai chose to devote

his time and energy to Forgotten Harvest to feed food-insecure families in metro Detroit. Anay was

unsettled by the number of people he saw asking for food when driving around the city. He stated, "I always wondered how people could survive without enough food and thought of helping them, but never got a chance."

He decided to act. During the month of February, Anay and his friend Niranjan collected empty soda cans, canned food, and have



so far raised \$346.77, all of which are being put towards Forgotten Harvest's Healthy Food, Healthy Kids initiative! ith the school year coming to an end, thousands of children will lose their access to the National School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs. On average, Forgotten Harvest's "Healthy Food Healthy Kids" program provides approximately 130,000 lunches to thousands of children throughout metro Detroit every summer. Distribution is targeted to key community partners serving a significant number of at-risk children.

Among Forgotten Harvest's programs benefiting children, is our participation in USDA's Meet Up and Eat Up program, which succeeds due to our amazing partnerships with community heroes like Glenda Fields and her Gateway Garden.

Gateway Garden is a community garden nestled in the Jefferson Chalmers neighborhood on Detroit's east side. We took an afternoon to sit amongst the fairy garden next to the mobile library to discuss how Meet Up and Eat Up has benefited east side children.

During the summer, the Gateway Garden program starts at 11 am and runs Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday. Children commonly arrive without having had breakfast. With the program, Glenda has been able to feed numerous children lunch. She also sends each child home with kid-friendly food kits funded by United Way for Southeastern Michigan so they will have food in the evenings and on weekends.

"We really need these programs. We really need Meet Up and Eat Up. And we really need the food boxes to send home. They are very important and essential to these kids."

Gateway Garden becomes a safe place for not only children, but their parents too. Glenda's Garden enables countless parents facing hardships to get a break from stress, knowing their children have somewhere to relax and get the nutrition they need.

We want to reach more kids during the summer and during the school year. Children's meal programs, like Glenda's, help Forgotten Harvest provide nourishing meals to children.

4:00 am: At some of our pantries, the first cars start to arrive in line. 7:00 am: Driver picks up truck.

Meats and produce are the most requested items at our mobile pantries. Recently, a woman was brought to tears simply over a package of chicken drumsticks that she received to feed her family. The food that is provided daily to the community truly means

so much to so many.

8-9:00 am: Our dedicated and wonderful volunteers arrive.

Items are loaded into cars according to weight. We don't want any smooshed bread or eggs!

9:00 am: Pantry line opens with about 100-125 cars already waiting in line! (The increase in food prices has resulted in an increase in some of our lines.)





11-12:00 pm: Families will receive about 50-60 lbs of food. Sometimes pantry lines run out of food with cars still in line.

Six days a week, Forgotten Harvest helps to feed many families in metro Detroit. Food is ALWAYS given away FREE of charge to anyone in need!

DRIVING HUNGER FROM METRO DETROIT COMMUNITY TRUCK CAMPAIGN

For our neighbors from our friends! Our trucks, quite literally, make possible our mission of "driving hunger from metro Detroit." Comprised of more than 35 vehicles — including refrigerated box trucks, refrigerated tractor semi-trailers, refrigerated commercial vans, and pick-up trucks and trailers used on our farm — our fleet provides the critical link between our many food donors, our warehouse, and our network of agencies distributing nutritious food to metro Detroit families facing hunger.

We need to replace several trucks over the next few years. Each truck lasts about 10 years, distributing over 2,000,000 lbs of food and driving over 500,000 miles to help care for and feed food-insecure children, families, Veterans, and seniors — our neighbors in need.

This spring, Forgotten Harvest seeks critical funds to replace several of our trucks to sustain our expanded levels of food rescue and distribution.

We are asking our community to join in partnership with Forgotten Harvest to raise

over \$200,000, which is necessary to purchase a new refrigerated box truck. Donors of \$250 or more will have their name permanently displayed on the FH truck driving around metro Detroit picking up and distributing surplus nutritious food to our neighbors in need. We will schedule an opportunity to come to the warehouse to see the truck once it is completed, allowing ample opportunities for photos, tours of the facility, and connection with your fellow donors that made this purchase possible!
