OUR VISION :

We know the challenges faced by the neighbors we serve. We know the desperation of parents who try so hard to provide for their families, and yet still come up short. We see unimaginable circumstances every day forcing our neighbors into impossible decisions about which basic need to prioritize and which to do without.

Staying sufficiently fed shouldn't require choosing food over other necessities like medicine, housing, or utilities. But on a daily basis, it means just that for so many we serve. At this moment, more than 587,000 children, adults, and seniors in our region struggle to keep enough food on the table. That is one in six individuals. For many of our friends and neighbors, all it takes is one employment change, one household change, or one illness to push them into food insecurity and a battle for proper nutrition. In a nation that produces more food than it can hope to use, hunger should be history.

Forgotten Harvest shows up day after day to work toward that ideal and truly make a difference in the lives of Metro Detroiters. We're always rethinking what it means to address hunger in a way that doesn't just fill calorie deficits but delivers complete nutrition, and we dig deep into partnerships that help us take decisive action toward solutions. Forgotten Harvest's work helps create a food-secure community by transforming surplus food into accessible nourishment, fostering sustainable communities, and getting involved in the changes leading to food justice, equity, and environmental stewardship.



CLIENT HIGHLIGHT

Forgotten Harvest strives to ensure our neighbors can access a variety of nutritious food to nourish themselves and their families. We believe everyone should have enough food for their well-being, so we give it to those in need for free.

Tina T. and her husband Donnie each have health conditions that limit their ability to work. When disability payments weren't enough to cover all of their needs, Tina decided to try a Forgotten Harvest distribution she found through Facebook.

She said, "Frustrated by not making ends meet and frankly always seeming to be hungry due to lack of groceries, I decided to show up on that cold March 2024 Monday morning...what a blessing it would turn out to be! I was SO shocked and overwhelmed (so was my husband!) by the first several times I was there. I would weep with gratitude and joy after I would come home, open my trunk, and just stare at the bounty that I received."

Feeding our neighbors with high-quality ingredients and food items is important to us—and to those we serve. Tina told us, "So many of the items received I would have never bought or tried without Forgotten Harvest. I now keep a tray of fresh veg and fruit on my counter at all times for anyone to snack on. One of the most coveted items that we have received is the shrimp! Husband and I both love shrimp. We were very aware of the value of this one item...a high-protein food that we could not afford made its way into our diet because of Forgotten Harvest!"

From produce to protein and each food group in between, Forgotten Harvest and our partners help provide a balanced mix of food for the people who rely on us for a hand up when they need it.





PROGRAMS:

FORGOTTEN HARVEST DEVELOPS PROGRAMS THAT NOT ONLY ADDRESS IMMEDIATE FOOD INSECURITY BUT ALSO EMPOWER COMMUNITIES THROUGH TARGETED INITIATIVES THAT ENABLE US TO BETTER SERVE THE 587,000 METRO DETROITERS WHO RELY ON OUR ORGANIZATION EACH YEAR. THE CORE SUPPORT PROGRAMS OF OUR OPERATION ARE DETAILED BELOW.

MOBILE PANTRY PROGRAM Enables us to feed hundreds of families per distribution in under-served areas and last year delivered 24.97m lbs. of food in farmers' market type settings. Over 330,180 recipients were assured a healthy assortment of meats, dairy, grains, produce, and produce. That would otherwise be unaffordable and unavailable to families without the help of the Forgotten Harvest Mobile Pantry Program.

FORGOTTEN HARVEST ON-THE-GO MOBILE PANTRY PROGRAM Distributes food to high-poverty, under-served neighborhoods without a permanent emergency food distribution location. New Forgotten Harvest On-the-Go sites are chosen based on the food-insecurity index developed in coordination with Landgrid and Data Driven Detroit. These sites are used to help us grow our pantry network.

HEALTHY FOOD HEALTHY KIDS Enables Forgotten Harvest to target distributions to the more than 170,000 Metro Detroit children in food-insecure households where they are already gathering—at schools, agencies with enrichment and education programs, and communities with high levels of child food insecurity.

HEALTHY FOOD HEALTHY SENIORS Addresses the critical need to increase access to nutritious fresh food for low-income Metro Detroit seniors. More than 18,480 of these seniors live in the City of Detroit, where 19.7% of seniors live in poverty. Forgotten Harvest works with a diverse network of pantries, many that are solely focused on supporting the lives of seniors, providing them much needed nutritious food that increases their health and wellness.



USDA CHILD NUTRITION – SFSP/CACFP SFSP, also known in Michigan as “Meet Up and Eat Up,” is operated at the local level during summer months by program sponsors and is administered by MI Department of Education (MDE). CACFP is a sponsor-operated and MDE-administered school-year program for children (<18) who participate in structured, after-school programs in lower-income areas. The programs provide healthy meals and snacks.

SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM Ensures that children under 18 in lower-income areas continue to receive nutritious meals during summer vacations when they do not have access to the National School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs.

YOUTH SNACK PROGRAM Provided 208,000 nutritious snacks last year to kids from kindergarten to high school attending afterschool and summer educational programs at enrichment programs throughout Metro Detroit. The snacks encourage children and teens to attend programming to receive help with school work and participate in various educational programs

VETERAN SUPPORT PROGRAM Supports those who have served our country bravely and shouldn’t be forced to endure the agony of not knowing if they can feed their families. In 2024, Forgotten Harvest worked with six Veteran-specific agency partners, providing over 831,398 lbs. of food. Forgotten Harvest continues to establish additional Veteran partnerships to help change an unacceptable situation for the many individuals who have given so much of their lives for the safety of our nation.

HARVEST HEROES Our trucks traverse the Metro Detroit community six days a week, rescuing food from various sources, but some pick-up requests are too small to send a box truck – that’s where Harvest Heroes comes to the rescue. A team of 42 volunteers use their personal vehicles to hit the road weekly, making stops at independent grocers, caterers, restaurants, and other suppliers. The volunteers then deliver the food to nearby pantries.

FORGOTTEN HARVEST FARMS Situated on 95 acres of donated land in Fenton with an annual yield of 628,553 lbs. of fresh, healthy produce. Forgotten Harvest Farms grows and harvests crops such as potatoes, sweet corn, green beans, cabbage, collard greens, zucchini, watermelon, carrots, chili peppers, and mustard greens. The farm allows Forgotten Harvest to ensure that Metro Detroit families will consistently benefit from fresh, healthy foods that are often unavailable or unaffordable to them.

SPECIAL THANKS TO OUR VOLUNTEER RESCUE TEAM

Last fiscal year, individual volunteers and corporate, school, and civic groups completed **101,474** hours of dedicated service through **30,361** volunteer visits to help realize our mission. Without this critical and generous support, Metro Detroiters in need wouldn't have received the food assistance they rely on to help them through tough times.



Forgotten Harvest offers a variety of ways to get involved in the mission, knowing everyone has different interests, talents, and abilities. We have morning and afternoon opportunities at our West Eight Mile Distribution Center for up to 75 people in each time slot. These volunteers help our team create family-size portions from bulk rescued food and glean and repackage the food that comes in through the Grocery Rescue Program. Our Community Choice Mobile Markets need volunteers daily to "shop" with our neighbors and keep the shelves stocked as needed. Forgotten Harvest Farms now welcomes volunteers year-round, thanks to our greenhouse. Interested individuals can also join our Speakers Bureau, Harvest Heroes rescue team, Site Monitor opportunities, or Link2Feed specialists, and we have specialty volunteer events throughout the year for things like food shows and apple picking in the fall.



Forgotten Harvest can only function because of our volunteers. Our work is an entire community's work, and we're so grateful to our neighbors for getting involved so we can continue feeding those in need with nourishing food.

PARTNERSHIP HIGHLIGHT | KENSINGTON CHURCH - HOME DELIVERY

Kensington Church in Macomb was selected to help pilot our Hub & Spoke Home Delivery Program that enables our food delivery partnership with Amazon and DoorDash to reach a greater number of our neighbors in need. Home Delivery has been extremely valuable for many we serve, but we initially found its limits in a radius restriction of the delivery address from the pick-up location. To extend the capabilities of this program, we have enabled a “Hub & Spoke” distribution model with some of our agency partners.

Those signed up for Home Delivery from this new Hub & Spoke location receive a dry goods emergency food box created at our Oak Park main campus and then delivered in bulk to Kensington Church. Delivery drivers service the 10-mile radius around the church, including more geographical area than we had delivery access to before, and, in turn, enabling Forgotten Harvest to serve more of the community that isn't able to get to one of the pantry partners in their area.

We're grateful to be able to provide this program for home-bound seniors, people with mobility challenges, and those without reliable transportation. Through all of Forgotten Harvest's experience, our team recognizes that there are many barriers to food security. It's our responsibility to make sure we're investigating any and all avenues leading to greater food access for our neighbors. Whether they're struggling with a lack of mobility, the income gap, unexpected medical expenses, a change in family composition, or something else, Forgotten Harvest is here to help support Metro Detroiters experiencing food insecurity with nourishing food.



COMMUNITY CHOICE MARKETS

NEW DISTRIBUTION METHODS TO MAXIMIZE IMPACT

Providing our neighbors in need with access to fresh, nutritious food where and when they need it is something Forgotten Harvest always strives to do. Our Community Choice Market Program is one of the newest manifestations of that impact goal. These appointment-based mobile grocery stores can travel into particularly high-need communities and serve our guests where no other pantry partner is available. These markets offer our guests the ability to “shop” the store with one of our volunteers to choose the foods and quantities that meet their dietary needs, cultural requirements, and personal desires.

In our 2024 fiscal year, Forgotten Harvest established the first of our Community Choice Mobile Markets to fill this need. In the pilot roll-out, we partnered with two senior centers in Dearborn Heights to ensure seniors and older adults, one of the most vulnerable populations to food insecurity, have access to fresh, healthy foods that can help manage chronic illness and prevent other health issues.

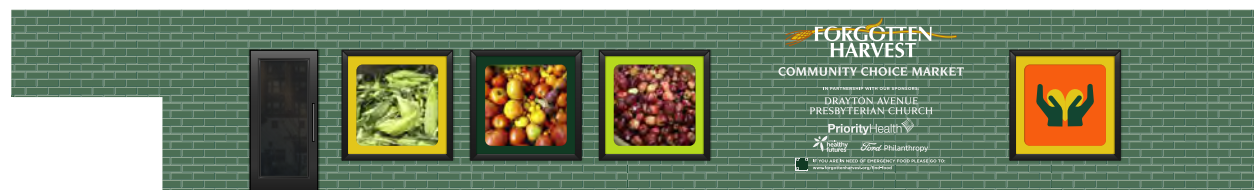




Our guests are able to choose the foods that help their families. This “shopping” experience leads to better engagement and fights hunger in a more dignified and positive way.

Forgotten Harvest envisions a future where we have four mobile markets serving our community six days a week with “shopping” appointments that help fill gaps in our neighbors’ food access. This supplemental support system is just one aspect of how Forgotten Harvest and your donor dollars are better serving the community.

Each time we pass the responsibility of food selection to our neighbors and prioritize personal choice and nonjudgment in the food assistance experience, the perceived stigma around food insecurity and those struggling with it is lifted, little by little. Infusing our service with practices that promote the personal dignity of our neighbors strengthens the greater supportive network throughout our community, rippling through and beyond the issue of food insecurity alone.

FOOD RESCUE PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

Forgotten Harvest rescues fresh, nutritious food from more than 700 unique food donor locations. These grocery stores, farms, processors, manufacturers, warehouses, distributors, dairies, restaurants, caterers, entertainment venues, and sports arenas donated the almost 45 million pounds of food that went directly to feed our Metro Detroit community during the 2023-2024 fiscal year. These partners generously donated this food to Forgotten Harvest so that we could distribute it free of charge to our neighbors in need.
